- 2. Would the number of employees increase as a result of the change?
- 3. Have the health effects of the proposed pollution increase been properly studied? This should be paramount. We breath the air and we cannot buy bottled air.
- 4. What is the increase of water usage associated with this project? Westrock currently is the biggest fresh water consumer, using as much water as all the residents combined.
- 5. How accurate are the estimates of increased pollution?
- 6. Have representatives of indigenous people weighed in on this proposal? Have vulnerable local populations been considered?
- 7. Finally: Is everyone at Ecology of one mind about approving this project, or are there dissenters?
