You see I live just beyond, I live off of Stadium Way. So, when I leave my garage, the first thing I see is WestRock. And some days I can't see beyond WestRock because of all the fumes and smoke and whatever they produce. So, in 2016 we stopped the methanol project. And now we've been working with the LNG to try to stop that and finally the Attorney General has stepped up. And, Tacoma—I used to be able to drive down 11th Street, from Pacific Avenue, all the way across the port. You can't even do that anymore. The port's gotten too big. It's gotten too powerful. It's gotten too greedy. And that land is tribal land, a lot of that land is. And another thing about that land - it's not solid. And—and all the, it just—every morning I see the stuff. And it's disgusting because I can smell it. And the air quality in Tacoma is not the greatest. It's by far from good. And they just want to increase it and, like Daniel said, I don't mind them wanting to upgrade. Upgrade's fine. Expansion is not. Last year there was a councilwoman, Walker Lee, on her last night she gave a green light to the port for expansion. And that was unbelievable because the port does not need all that expansion. Where are the trucks going to go? You know, there's a lot going on in that port. Something like 35-40,000 jobs? Let's make them a little safer. So I'm just asking for a denial here on the expansion of this project. Thank you.
