I would ask that you do a full environmental impact study on The Little Pend Orielle National Wildlife Refuge. It has 206 species of birds, 58 mammal, 8 reptile and 6 amphibian species. The Refuge is located in the Selkirk Mountain Range, Combining the Rockies & Cascades. The resulting 22 forest types provide habitat for several species of plants & animals. These include golden eagles, northen goshawk, great gray & flammulated owls, Vaux's swift, white-headed, pileated, Lewis and black backed woodpeckers, Canada geese, mallards, red-necked grebes, common goldeneyes, wood ducks, common & hooded mergansers. The Little Pend Orielle National WIIdlife Refuge is also habitat for the threatened Canada Lynx, Rubber Boa Snake,& the Western painted turtle & Western Toad. Show me how theses creatures and there habitats will not be affected by the smelters emissions.
