That's all I have to say. Oh wait, I do have one more thing. Somebody mentioned slope and I think that that is a very important thing to look at for this rule. We recently had, the landfill had to purchase some property from a neighbor because they couldn't fight the landfill fire because the slope was too steep for them to get their equipment on it.
