Washington's rivers are key to our quality of life. They provide clean drinking water for communities, support local economies, are critical to fish and wildlife, and create recreation opportunities. They are vital to our future. But they also face growing threats, including drought, diminished snowpack, rising temperatures, wildfire, development, and pollution.

ORW designation would provide powerful new protections for our most important rivers, streams, and wetlands. I am writing in support of ORW designation for the Cascade (Skagit) river system, as well as the other systems under consideration (Green and Napeequa) Rivers.
