In 2016, Inslee issued an executive order that requires polluters to reduce their emissions 5% every three years.

In January of 2020, The Washington State Supreme Court reaffirmed Ecology's authority to regulate greenhouse gasses from facilities such as paper mills and methanol refineries, but has now put the urgent need to regulate emissions from indirect sources such as tailpipes, and gas boilers, and other sources in the hands of the Legislature.

But for now, Kalama methanol will need to comply. How will they do that?
