There are significant adverse impacts to tribal cultural and religious resources, as explicitly expressed by the Confederated Tribes and Bands of the Yakama Nation (Yakama Nation). The Project threatens to destroy numerous archeological, ceremonial, burial, petroglyph monumental and ancestral use sites sacred to the Yakama Nation, and would interfere with the exercise of gathering, fishing, ceremony and passing of Yakama Nation's traditions. The environmental impacts are almost too many to count and there is the potential the artificial perched water system will fail due to geologic features. Economically the Project does not add more energy but actually requires energy to operate. The Draft EIS finds that there will be "significant and unavoidable adverse impacts" to cultural and tribal resources. It also indicates that there is no proposed mitigation for these impacts that is supported by Tribal Nations. While renewable energy and grid resilience are important considerations as we tackle the climate crisis, so too is the need to achieve environmental justice and to prevent disproportionate impacts of energy development on Indigenous communities.
