This Project threatens to destroy numerous archeological, ceremonial, burial, petroglyph monumental and ancestral use sites sacred to the Yakama Nation, and would interfere with the exercise of gathering, fishing, ceremony and passing of Yakama Nation's traditions. The Draft EIS finds that there will be "significant and unavoidable adverse impacts" to cultural and tribal resources. It also indicates that there is no proposed mitigation for these impacts that is supported by Tribal Nations. While renewable energy and grid resilience are important considerations as we tackle the climate crisis, so too is the need to achieve environmental justice and to prevent disproportionate impacts of energy development on Indigenous communities. "Clean energy" must not be built on the backs of Tribal Nations. Although I've lived in Bellingham the past 8 years, I was an Oregonian before that, lived in Portland, and felt highly connected to the Columbia and Willamette Rivers. I remain protective of usages along the river on either bank, supporting only those that won't destroy the scenic beauty for quick (or even slow) cash return. Sincerely, Meryle A.
