Dear Department of Ecology,

We must err on the side of protecting our dwindling salmon in the Puget Sound drainages. The starving Southern Resident Orcas depend on salmon to survive. Tribes depend on salmon. I oppose the Chehalis River Mega-Dam. Restore the Chehalis River floodplain. Move the flood-prone people and residences and businesses out of the Chehalis floodplain. That's the only ultimate solution.

More generally, I am writing to express my concerns about the proposed FRE dam on the upper Chehalis River. Based on the DEIS, the project would cause significant and unavoidable harm to salmon and steelhead, including major losses of Spring Chinook, Coho, Fall Chinook, and Steelhead populations. This stretch of the river is one of the Basin's key spawning areas, and once damaged, these habitats cannot be replaced.

I am also concerned about the scale and cost of the proposed structure, as well as the unresolved safety and geotechnical risks identified in the DEIS. At an estimated \$1.3–\$2.3 billion, the dam would offer limited benefits while putting the river's ecological health and the communities that rely on it at long-term risk.

More effective, less damaging flood-reduction approaches already exist, including the Local Actions Non-Dam Alternative. I urge Ecology to pursue these solutions instead of the proposed dam.
