Dear Comments,

I write as a member of America 's energy industry to say that I strongly oppose the DRBC 's proposed rule to severely limit and thereby effectively ban hydraulic fracturing within your jurisdiction.

Our industry serves the nation by powering our economy and helping keep energy affordable for millions of Americans. While producing and delivering energy is what we do, our priority is safety, which includes work that does not harm the environment. We work hard every day to ensure that our communities, work sites, and the environment are not put at risk.

Government data and scientific research make it clear that our commitment to safety is paying off. Hydraulic fracturing is safe and does not contaminate drinking water. The US EPA studied hydraulic fracturing and concluded that there is no evidence of the practice leading to routinely contaminating drinking water, and that the practice is not likely to contaminate groundwater. Given this evidence, your proposed rule goes too far. Please do not give credence to the misinformation promoted by extreme anti-energy groups.

The risks of allowing energy development in the DRBC region are minimal, but the benefits are certain. Domestic energy development is critical to our nation 's strength---to our economy, to job creation, and to our security. Households have extra money every year because we produce much of our own energy.

The DRBC 's proposed rule would take our nation in the wrong direction. Recognizing the strong safety record of energy development, the federal government has started unwinding unnecessary regulations that burden business and industry with little or no environmental benefit. The DBRC should go in the same direction.

I respectfully ask the Commission to withdraw its new draft regulation and replace it with rules to support, not restrict, American energy development. Thank you for your consideration.
