What is prompting this plan to begin post-delisting which will only accelerate steps to allow more hunting in the future?

Governor Jay Inslee (WA) had recently directed the Fish and Wildlife Agency to curb the hunting of wolves and stated: "The status quo of annual lethal removal is simply unacceptable." Instead, he encouraged your agency to focus on finding non-lethal solutions for conflicts between livestock and wolves.
