How to Plan a "wild for wolves Rendezvous"

Thank you for stepping up to protect wolves on **March 5th** for our Wild for Wolves Day!

Here is everything you need to know to plan your event.

What is a "Wild for Wolves Rendezvous"?:

As many wolf lovers know, when pups are old enough to leave the den but still too young to hunt, their families move the pups to new meet-up locations that scientists call "rendezvous sites". "Rendezvous" is French for "we all gather together at a specific time and place." While the pack goes out hunting, one adult member will be assigned to stay with the pups. These wolves are affectionately known as "babysitter wolves" and they care for the pups until the rest of the pack returns to reunite with them. This is just one example of how wolves take care of each other in community and why we're using the same name for our Wild for Wolves Day gatherings.

The goal of our "W4WR" is to build community and strengthen connections between wolf lovers across the country so that people are organized for the political battles to come. Wolves have shown us that we are stronger when we act together in community and "W4WR" is the first step in doing that by developing in-person connections.

By hosting/attending a "W4WR" event, you will:

- Connect with others locally who love wolves;
- Discuss the current threat to wolves & what we can do;
- Write/Collect comment cards to oppose the delisting of wolves;
- **Get inspired** and plan next steps for the fight ahead. Maybe even arrange a regular meet up time with your group!

Before:

Pick a location & time:

- Location: You can host at your home or just meet up at brewery/bar, café, or other social place and put it on the Ignite Change map.
- Time: Pick a time (probably between 5pm and 7pm) on Tuesday, March 5. Happy hour meet-ups tend to work great
- just keep dinner time in mind and make sure to keep the event to about an hour. If you can't do March 5, don't worry! Pick a time and place anytime that week (March 5 - 10) that works for you.

• Put your event on the **Ignite Change Map!**

- Once you have the details of where & when your event will take place, <u>fill out this quick form</u> and put your meeting on our national map. Here is a sample description you can use:
 - Join us for a Wild for Wolves Rendezvous in [Location] on March 5 at [date, time] to connect other people who love wolves, learn about the current threat from the Trump administration, write comments, and plan next steps. Looking forward to meeting you!

Welcome

 Greet everyone who shows up personally - make sure they feel warmly welcomed and appreciated for showing up :)

Introductions & Sharing Why You Love Wolves

• Share what you love about wolves and ask everyone to introduce themselves (name, where they live) and one thing they love about wolves or why they want to protect them.

• Issue Rundown: The threat to America's wolves and what we can do to help

• Tell the group why wolves need us to take action right now. You'll want to keep it short and simple - We'll provide an **event template script** and add it here soon.

Have everyone fill out their own comment letter to the Trump administration

- Make sure you bring enough pens for everyone and get a photo of all the filled cards so you can tag Trump and USFWS on social media and let him know your group's messages are on their way along with messages from thousands of your fellow Ignite Change wolf activists.
- Please be sure to ask everyone to hand-write in a personalized sentence or two of their own on the comment letter (e.g., a sentence about why wolves are important to protect, or a sentence expressing concern that if wolves don't have federal protections states could allow them to be shot and trapped).
- Ask others in the bar, café, or meet up space to fill one out too!

Plan Next Steps Together

Let folks know that to win, we need to build a ton of momentum to stop this attack on wolves. Ask if anyone
is interested in helping gather more comments in your community & brainstorm locations and times you can
