Needed 90% of the time needs to be boots on the ground living with the wolf as in actually observing, working with the rural folks who are interfacing with these critters, becoming intimately aquainted with the wolf, the prey base, the rancher, the rural folks, No more computer modeling and managment by popular vote be folks who have no clue.

Do you have general comments about the scope of Washington's updated wolf conservation and management plan?

Long term impacts of the wolf on the wildlife as in the deer/elk has not been considered. The impact on the rancher and other rural folks has not been well documented and the long term financial impacts have not been considered or reimbursed for the long term loss. Also not considered is the impact of the grizzly fiasco and having 2 apex predators on the landscape without a boots on the ground long term study of the food source as in plants, bulb, berries, ungulates. I have a diary of a local native in documenting the mtn goats in the N Cascades, this person spent much time living with and understanding the ways of the mtn goat. This is what needs to happen with the wolf and the grizzly. No more computer modeling, no more reading a book, only hands on boots on the ground to become intimately acquainted with the landscape, the vegetation, and the critters by first hand knowledge and that means year around not just one or 2 days o a week or two. Email me and I will share with you Art Ryals Mountain Goat Diary that he kept for 50 ys so you get an idea of the dedication and knowledge of the goats on the mountain landscape.
