Do you have general comments about the scope of Washington's updated wolf conservation and management plan?

I do not want wolves reintroduced. I am a solo hiker and recreationalist and don't want to carry a gun. I am actually off Road and gunless for several weeks of time over the year. I mostly run, hike, fish, and back country ski. I do not hunt and an not a redneck, but a liberal Dad who's lived in Seattle most of his life.

I understand the danger I face from black bears, cougars, and just being alone in the woods and have always accepted it. I do not accept bringing back wolves and Grizzly Bears. I think there would be few people who do what I do that want this happening. It's easy to sit around Seattle and Bainbridge Island and romanticize about how cool it would be to haves wolves roaming the wilderness again. When you are the first guy up a remote Canyon in the Teanaway and you see canine prints that have followed you, you feel a bit different. That morning I had already seen a mama bear with a cub, and Cougar tracks on a snow covered logging road. I am not a scared person - but I do have my limits. My Canadian friends know the dangers of living with wolves and don't act like they safe...The lack of serious encounters is mostly because the wolf has been driven out - and encounters are rare. If this program is successful and there are more and more human wolf encounters there will be injuries and deaths - and everyone will blame those who think reintroduction is cool....Abe also beennwith my wife and young daughter in Canada and had a pack "bark howling" around us. My daughter is now a grown up working as an ecologist. She too is totally against reintroduction.
