The current policy and practice of exteminating gray wolf packs in Washington State has to stop. Even if they are killing livestock being grazed on public lands, as well as private lands within the same ecological zone of the public lands that support wolf packs, it seems the status quo is much more about protecting the grazing interests of a very small minority of influential ranchers, rather than being focused on protecting a naturally occuring species that was a key part of this areas apex predator biology long before ranching existed in this area.
