WDFW needs to look at post-recovery management from ALL angles, including no legal wolf hunts, and the biological science and repercussions of each management strategy.

Science, not emotion, should guide the entire process, along with education about that science. Educating Washingtonians of all backgrounds and stances, about all sides of the situation, should be heavily looked at and considered, as part of the post-recovery (and recovery) discussion, both inside the department and outside.

ALL WDFW staff should remain open and neutral in comments and official stances while the process is happening, not leading the public to believe anything has already been decided. Care should be taken to not have it implied unintentionally as well.
