Dear NMED staff, My name is Fernanda. I live in San Diego, and I am writing because I am concerned about the risks and harms Project Jupiter poses to New Mexicans. I am submitting this comment to urge the New Mexico Environment Department to reject Yucca Growth Infrastructure, LLC's air permit application for the YGI Microgrid in Doña Ana County. Since I was a little girl I've been extremely passionate about the environment which is OUR HOME, and that passion hasn't died out, in fact it's been so present that I graduated as a bioengineer just to be able to help somehow our planet. This project is extremely dangerous, it will kill everything, animals and plants alike. But it will also kill us, we CANNOT EAT MONEY. This project will only reduce our natural resources and when they died out, I wonder what will you buy when there will be nothing to eat. The project's proposed fuel cell powered grid is concerning for many reasons: It would still produce a high level of greenhouse gas and toxic pollutants. This technology generates toxic waste, and the process for handling this waste is still unclear. Fuel cell technology or a centralized waste system has never been tried at this scale. Surrounding communities' air will be severely impacted by this development. I urge the NMED to reject YUCCA Yucca Growth Infrastructure, LLC's air permit application for the YGI Microgrid. I ask the department to please hold a bilingual public hearing near the Santa Teresa community, so that residents can learn about the risks associated with fuel cell technology.
