This project is extremely concerning. Instead of working with community, being transparent, and following the law, Oracle/OpenAI have consistently done the exact opposite. They're currently paying people \$25/hr to canvass my neighborhood and get them to submit an automated form letter in support of this air quality permit, and if someone has concerns or doesn't support it, they're simply throwing away that person's comment/feedback. I can't think of anything that breaks trust with New Mexicans more than that.

Top it off with the fact that this permit would give them permission to pollute Southern NM as much as a new city of 700,000+ people (bigger than Albuquerque and Las Cruces combined), and they're working with a company (Bloom Energy) who has never built a fuel cell technology project at this scale before, and it's a disaster in the making.

I believe our state will grow, but this is irresponsible, and if New Mexicans have to live with this facility, then Oracle and these other out of state companies and their wealthy executives and shareholders need to be responsible. This is clearly not that.

Deny this permit and make them go back and try again, if they can afford to pour millions into TV ads, elections, paying social media influencers, etc. they can afford to build a project that doesn't destroy our communities. And if they don't want to do that, I understand, but they don't belong in NM.
