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I think it would be a terrible decision to build a data center in Dona Ana county, or anywhere else for that matter. The planet is facing historic high temperatures, and infrastructure for water and electricity is under enough strain as is. By beginning massive construction like this for an unstable and unnecessary venture like modern AI projects, ordinary people will be priced out of necessities like home cooling and tap water, all for the sake of investors with a proven track record of bad behavior, including illegal pollution and dumping, along with privacy violations. Countless other data centers have spiked noise, water, and air pollution, leading to public health crises and it is clear that New Mexicans are looking down the barrel of yet another known danger that the federal government is subjecting us to in hopes it will be forgotten. In resubmitting the same plans virtually unchanged, despite public outcry, project Jupiter's developers show a belief that the rule of law and democratic input should not apply to them.

"The public should be given an additional 60 days to review and comment on the air quality permit so community members can participate equitably.

The air quality permit application should be denied outright given Bloom Energy's history of illegal dumping hazardous waste. Approving this permit would be government-sponsored environmental racism directed at residents of Doña Ana County.

If the permit is not denied outright, a public hearing needs to be held in Santa Teresa, in both English and Spanish, with an option to participate virtually."
