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AI is ruining our world. It's ruining our planet, our people and our lives. AI data centres are destroying our wildlife, and biodiversity is rapidly declining. So many endangered species are losing their space to thrive and reproduce and simply live their lives. Families are losing access to clean drinking water, a basic human necessity and may I add a human right, from overconsumption of generative AI. There are so many more problems than just our environment, though. People are lacking common sense, initiative and basic knowledge, and we have generative AI to thank for this. Having unlimited and public access to generative AI means that people are beginning to completely rely on this. Humans are quite simply becoming stupid; having no initiative at all thanks to "just asking ChatGPT" and not bothering to go and research something because, again, they can "just ask ChatGPT". AI itself isn't the problem, it's the accessibility and publicity. AI should be used as a tool, not to replace everything we already know. Artificial Intelligence should be used as a tool for specialists in certain sectors, e.g. healthcare and emergency services. Giving the public unlimited access to AI means that our brains are declining, lacking the stimulation they need to grow new brain cells and form important connections. New Mexico Environment Department should give the public an additional 60 days to review and comment on the air quality permit so community members can participate equitably.

The air quality permit application should be denied outright given Bloom Energy's history of illegal dumping hazardous waste. Approving this permit would be government-sponsored environmental racism directed at residents of Doña Ana County.

If the permit is not denied outright, a public hearing needs to be held in Santa Teresa, in both English and Spanish, with an option to participate virtually.
