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The water crisis in New Mexico is so bad it is actively palpable. Even in the past two years, climate change has genuinely changed the seasonal patterns here. It no longer snows in March, last year there was barely any snow on the ground. There has not even been a monsoon this summer. To build something that has this much environmental impact in a state like New Mexico is jaw dropping. People live in New Mexico for the peace, quiet, lights in the night sky, the nature, and the lack of things like giant light pollution emitting data centers. To build this data center in New Mexico is an insult and an affront to everything this state stands for. This state is called the Land of Enchantment. It exists apart from other states in our country specifically for it's peace and nature and the way it is some ways removed from the technology and focus around electronics and AI and data that exists in other places. This is the beauty of this land. This land is sacred. To build not only a data center, but one of the largest data centers in New Mexico of all places is the largest offense to the people who live here and the way of life we choose that I could possibly think of. We are already trying to deal with the way the water crisis affects our lives and our landscape WITHOUT a data center. The entire state, every business, every part of our government understands we are in severe drought. To even entertain the idea of building a data center here of all places seems laughable and comical, and something that is completely devoid of common sense. There is no way to conclude that this data center will not wreak havoc on our state. The concept of this data center being built is bewildering, reckless, stupid, and so devoid of common sense and any thought for how the lives of the people in this state will be affected that I am left utterly shocked by the decision making process of anyone who is involved in approving the building of this facility. I mean come on, get real.
