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Even though the technology powering Project Jupiter is to be changed, that does not alter the risks. The land Project Jupiter has already begun construction on has trouble producing decent air quality. This project will only cause more harm to the land and communities. Project Jupiter has already been shown to produce more greenhouse gases, further ruin the little air quality the land already has, and generate tons of hazardous waste. New Mexico communities have already done the math and research and know the numbers connected to these risks will be tremendously higher than the three largest cities in New Mexico combined. Furthermore, I, a citizen of New Mexico is in full agreement with my community that the air quality permit should be denied, especially since Bloom Energy's history of illegal dumping of hazardous waste, and if not denied, a public hearing needs to be held in Santa Teresa, in both English and Spanish, with an option to participate virtually. I also request that the public is given an additional sixty days to review and comment on the air quality permit, so community members can participate equitably.
