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If the New Mexico Environment Department's (NMED) mission is "to protect and restore the environment and to foster a healthy and prosperous NM for present and future generations" then the air quality permit application should be denied given Bloom Energy's history of illegal dumping hazardous waste. Bloom Energy has been fined a total of \$1.4 million dollars for illegally storing, transporting, and dumping this hazardous waste in several states AND falsifying records over many years to cover it up. The public should be given an additional 60 days to review and comment on the air quality allowing so community members can participate equitably. Approving this permit would be government-backed environmental racism , because the people of Doña Ana County already suffer too much from environmental pollution. For years, Doña Ana County has been called a 'non-compliance' zone—this means that our air quality does not meet federal government rules. If the permit is not denied, a public hearing needs to be held in Santa Teresa , in both English and Spanish, with an option to participate virtually. Project Jupiter's fuel cell plant will generate enormous amounts of hazardous waste containing: Cancer-causing chemicals (benzene) Heavy metals (lead, arsenic, chromium) Toxic compounds (sulfur and others) All of these poison the human body, our water, and our soil This fuel cell gas plant will release toxic chemical pollutants and 10 million tons of carbon dioxide into our air (see FCDX tables sourced directly from p. 150 of Air Permit) If the NMED Air Quality Office "protects the public health of New Mexicans and the natural beauty of the state by preventing the deterioration of air quality" then the the air quality permit application should be denied because Project Jupiter will produce more air pollution than the two consumer electrical grids that power NM families and businesses.
