I am submitting this comment to urge the New Mexico Environment Department to reject Yucca Growth Infrastructure, LLC's air permit application for the YGI Microgrid in Doña Ana County. I am an African immigrant from Nigeria that happens to a very tropical region. The last heat wave was so horrible due to my region already being tropical that I cannot even begin to imagine what life will be like to be beside such a horrible project that Jupiter is. Not only will you be negatively impacting the residents and nature of New Mexico but you will also affect the world with ur horrible machines. Humans are smart and intelligent we DO NOT NEED UR AI. Ur Ai will affect our thinking skills, our environment, our future and children's future and the planet that was kind enough to give us a place to survive. I urge the NMED to reject YUCCA Yucca Growth Infrastructure, LLC's air permit application for the YGI Microgrid. I ask the department to please hold a bilingual public hearing near the Santa Teresa community, so that residents can learn about the risks associated with fuel cell technology.
