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Our communities are already suffering from a lack of natural resources. You can barely float down the Rio Grande, a pass time that was enjoyed by thousands of New Mexicans a year to cool off during the summer. It is not justifiable to allocate our limited resources to a corporation when the citizens, generations of New Mexicans, continue to suffer from the drought. The agricultural communities, which are integral to our local economy, would also suffer if, in time, they are restricted to fewer resources to the data centers benefit.

I find it crucial to add that just because Project Jupiter uses "less water" and "cleaner energy" it does not negate the AMOUNT of energy and water used. You are asking New Mexicans, most who already struggle to provide for their families, to sacrifice their resources for a "better tomorrow". Well, there will be no better tomorrow if there is no clean air, no clean water, and utility costs rise. New Mexico is not a place for a data center. When we value artificial intelligence over human intelligence, human life, and human rights, we have failed as a society. I beg you not to look at the money, not to be greedy. I beg that you look at the bigger picture and the larger effects. Sure, the negatives won't happen all at once...but they WILL happen.

New Mexico officials should prioritize community needs over corporate ones. As a born and raised New Mexican, it is exhausting seeing the state and even my county break their back for million dollar payouts and not for the best interest of their constituents. Putting an end to Project Jupiter and their lies would be in the state's and environment's best interests.
