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New Mexicans do not want or need a massive data center in New Mexico!

The Key Concerns of our Community Regarding Project Jupiter Are:

Water Usage:

Project Jupiter is projected to use approximately 7.2 million gallons of water annually, with a one-time fill-up of 10 million gallons for its data centers.

Impact on Local Water Supply:

As we have watched the Rio Grand drained to a trickle this spring, the river bed is now completely dry earlier than ever before. This project's water consumption would further compromise New Mexico fragile ecosystems. In a state where water has been strictly regulated and residents are charged more for water consumption during peak consumption periods this proposal would drain precious limited resources and jeopardize the minimal stores we have. Raising alarming concerns in a region already facing years of drought and severe water scarcity. Considering the average daily water production of the Camino Real Regional Utility Authority is only 2.6 million gallons, how could this project possibly be a reasonable or ethical proposal?

Long-term Environmental Costs:

The environmental degradation from such a large-scale project would absolutely outweigh any short-term economic benefits.

Air Pollution Risks:

The construction and operation of the data centers would contribute to air pollution, posing a real and sustained health risks to surrounding communities.

Community Exploitation:

Project Jupiter has demonstrated a total lack of transparency and left our communities feeling blindsided by the projects rapid progression and grossly insufficient public consultation and information sharing from our local officials.

False Promises:

The assurances of job creation and economic growth through this project are hollow at best. Past examples and experiences suggest that such projects exploit local communities without delivering on their promises.

The immoral and corrupt track record of this project has revealed a strong need for thorough oversight and scrutiny of any project to ensure that community interests are prioritized over corporate profits.

Conclusion

The concerns of New Mexicans surrounding Project Jupiter reflect our values and the future we want for our state. The health and well-being of local communities and the environment should always supercede the interests of corporations. It is crucial to prioritize sustainable practices and

transparent governance in any future developments in our state.

We demand an end to this project and stronger state wide protections from this kind of extractive exploitative corporate industry entering our state in the future!
