

Anthony Foreman

My name is Anthony Foreman. I serve as a City Councilor here in Carlsbad, and I also own a construction business in this community. I am wearing two hats, one of an elected official who represents the people of this city, and as a business owner who understands firsthand what economic stability means for the people who work for you.

Carlsbad's construction and contractor community is deeply connected to WIPP. When that facility is operating at full capacity, work flows. Projects move. People stay employed. I have seen it directly in my own business and in the businesses of countless others across this town. Any disruption to WIPP's operations doesn't stay behind those facility gates — it shows up in reduced contracts, slower growth, and harder decisions for business owners trying to take care of their people.

What is being proposed here is a permit modification that would force WIPP to restructure its priorities in a way that slows things down — and for reasons that have not been clearly or adequately justified. As a councilor, I have an obligation to ask tough questions on behalf of my constituents. As a business owner, I have a responsibility to speak up when something threatens the economic foundation of this community. Today I am doing both.

I am formally opposing this modification and calling on NMED to extend the public comment period by 60 days and to hold a public hearing. The people of Carlsbad deserve more time and more transparency before a decision of this magnitude moves forward.

This community has invested in this mission for a long time. We are not asking for special treatment — we are asking to be heard.
