The current webpage content is on page 1, and the proposed content is on page 2 in Track Changes. The current first sentence is not exactly accurate, a bit confusing, and not needed. The current second sentence, minus the word "nearby" is all that is needed to start this section. "...abandoned or deteriorated water well..." is the appropriate wording in the second bullet.
