I am writing to provide feedback on the DPR (Department of Pesticide Regulation) Strategic Plan and to address an important consideration regarding language access, particularly in the creation of pesticide regulation study manuals. I deeply value the work that DPR does in safeguarding our environment and ensuring responsible pesticide use. However, I believe there's a crucial aspect that needs attention: providing these resources in languages other than English for communities where English is not the primary language.

Considerations:

- 1. Language Diversity: California, for example, is a diverse state with many languages spoken by its residents, including Spanish, Mandarin, Korean, and more. It's important for DPR to acknowledge this linguistic diversity and make resources accessible to all.
- 2. Small Scale Farmers: Small scale farmers are an essential part of our agricultural community, yet many are left without crucial resources due to language barriers. Creating pesticide regulation study manuals in their native languages would empower them to comply with regulations and make informed decisions.
- 3. Resource Accessibility: Small-scale farmers may lack access to resources or translation services. Providing manuals in their native language eliminates barriers and ensures equitable access to essential information.
- 4. Environmental Impact: Language access isn't just a matter of fairness; it also has an environmental impact. When all farmers can access and understand pesticide regulations, they are more likely to use these chemicals responsibly, reducing potential environmental harm.
- 5. Community Engagement: By addressing language barriers, DPR can foster better engagement and collaboration with communities. This inclusivity enhances trust and cooperation in pesticide regulation efforts.

I strongly recommend that DPR consider the creation of pesticide regulation study manuals in languages other than English, prioritizing those languages that are most prominent in their counties. This step would align with the principles of equity, accessibility, and environmental responsibility.
